From the President and Executive Director

The Hebrew Free Loan Society, a Jewish microfinance organization and the oldest microfinance organization in New York City, has been making interest-free loans to those in need for more than a century. In Jewish tradition, helping people help themselves is the highest form of Tsedaka (charity). Our loans foster economic independence while preserving the dignity of the borrower. Since its founding in 1892, the Society has provided over \$240 million in loans to almost 870,000

borrowers, while maintaining a loss rate of less than 1%. Lent out again and again, our loan capital has the potential to help an unlimited number of people in perpetuity.

By continuously adapting interest-free lending to meet the emerging needs of the community, the Society has remained a vital resource throughout its long history. Over the past decade, we have focused on two groups identified by recent New York Jewish community studies as among the most vulnerable—immigrants from the Former Soviet Union (FSU) and large families of modest means in the ultra-Orthodox community. As of June 30, 2011, 52% of our loans outstanding, totaling over \$6.2 million, helped FSU immigrants and 23%, or over \$2.8 million, helped large Orthodox families.

In these difficult times, the Society's loans are even more essential. In addition to aiding newcomers who never "made it," our loans help FSU immigrants like Irina, Vadim and Sveta, described in this Report, who after years of unremitting effort finally achieved self-sufficiency but now require our assistance to cope with the unexpected impact of the financial crisis. At a time when credit is tight, even for the most creditworthy, our Microenterprise Program continues to help FSU immigrants and ultra-Orthodox families establish and expand small businesses as a route to economic selfsufficiency. Our Special Education Program has become a critical support for Jewish special education, providing bridge loans to enable families who have been found eligible for government assistance to pay private school tuition pending government reimbursement. The Program also includes a robust partnership with Advocates for Children that benefits low-income, severely learning-disabled children throughout New York's diverse communities.



The Society's innovative work attracted recognition this past year both within and outside the Jewish community. UJA-Federation of New York and the J.E. & Z.B. Butler Foundation recognized our special education loan programs by awarding our Executive Director their annual "community change agent" award last December. We received grants from both the Hadassah Foundation and the Jewish Women's Foundation of New York to

support our new core business training program for ultra-Orthodox women, launched last spring, the only one of its kind on North America. The Ford Foundation gave us a Good Neighbors Committee grant for general operating support in September, 2010. In September, we were also selected by the Wagner School of Public Administration of New York University to host a student consulting team for its final year "Capstone" project. The work done by the Wagner students culminated in the launch this September of a greatly enhanced Student Loan Program for FSU immigrant families.

The Society held a successful second annual fundraising event in May, 2011, and we are now in the process of planning for our hundred and twentieth anniversary celebration in 2012. Few organizations combine our longevity, continuity of mission, and present vitality. Indeed, our use of the interest-free loan to extend a "hand up with dignity" is more important than ever in this second decade of the 21st century.

Since 1892, donors committed to the singular power of the interest-free loan have enabled us to meet evolving needs in the Jewish community and beyond. Your ongoing support in our 120th year is much appreciated.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Our Programs

In these difficult times, the unemployed and underemployed who are struggling to make ends meet include many recent immigrants whose ability to achieve the American dream has been severely undercut by the recession. Here is how our loans have helped hard-working families regain their financial equilibrium.



Irina and Vadim arrived in New York from Baku, Azerbaijan, in 1994 with two young children. Vadim, a dentist by training, became a self-employed dental technician, producing bridges, crowns and other dental appliances. Irina was originally a nurse; after giving

birth to a third child, she started working as a home attendant. Their combined income provided economic security.

Then, in 2011, with their middle child still in college and their youngest in high school, Vadim's business revenues plummeted, and suddenly the family was facing hardship. When Irina embarked on a two-year ultrasound technician course, our \$15,000 Immigrant Retraining loan (repayable once she completes her program) covered almost all of her tuition. After she graduates, her enhanced earning power will help restore the family to economic stability.



Sveta left Ukraine with her husband and toddler in 1988. In Kiev, she taught Russian language and literature. Here in New York, Sveta studied cosmetology and hairdressing and ultimately opened her own salon in Queens. Shortly after the birth of a second child, the couple divorced, but Sveta remained able to support her two children. Then, in early 2010, sharply reduced revenues forced her to close the business. With no income, she exhausted her savings in five months and, with no family to help out, was forced to borrow on credit cards in order to cover basic expenses. When Sveta finally found a job as a hairdresser, she took home 30% less than she had earned from her business.

Thanks to our \$5,000 Immigrant General Aid loan, Sveta has been able to repay almost all of her accumulated high-interest credit card debt. Because our loans are interest-free, it will take her less than two years to repay us even on her sharply reduced salary, and Sveta will free herself from the potential downward spiral of high-interest debt.


